St Patrick's Day Flag Raising:

Any Google search will tell you what most already know – Wednesday 17th March each year commemorates Saint Patrick and the arrival of Christianity in Ireland and celebrates the heritage and culture of the Irish in general. Celebrations generally involve public parades and festivals, céilís, and the wearing of green attire or shamrocks. In Ballarat the "17th" falls neatly in the celebration of "Harmony Fest"

This year, thanks to the "City of Ballarat" we also had the Irish Flag flown in Sturt Street for the day as another part of Harmony Fest. Hopefully you saw articles in both "The Courier" and "The Times" covering the St Patrick's Day Flag Raising. We really appreciate the media coverage. Following is an outline of speeches made on the day. We were hoping to record them but the traffic noise ruled that out.



Ballarat City Council Mayor – Daniel Moloney:

As we stand under this unfurling flag and listen carefully; you can hear in the breeze the songs, the stories and the poetry that connects us.

And in our hearts you can feel our ancestors calling from across the seas and throughout Australia.

It reminds us of what it is to be of Irish heritage on this special St Patrick's day. A day of great celebration throughout the world.

Daniel also explained his Irish heritage.

Phillip Moore - BDIA:

On this celebratory occasion we are reminded that amongst our Sturt Street avenue of honoured statues are two great Irish Ancestors; they are Peter Lalor and Thomas Moore.

Their early unveiling over a century ago was in both cases a wonderful cross-cultural event and as then and now these two exceptional men have been cherished by our Ballarat community and visitors for their great contribution to our lives.

I would ask Brian Shanahan (BDIA President) and Helen

Bath (Vice President) respectively to speak briefly of Peter Lalor and Thomas Moore.





Brian Shanahan OAM - BDIA President

Peter Lalor – It was on 30th November preceding the Eureka Stockade Battle of December 3rd 1854 that Irishman Peter Lalor came forward at a Monster Meeting at Bakery Hill to take leadership of diggers in their decision to stand and fight for their rights and liberties and their demands for democracy.

These diggers came from over 20 different countries with the prospect for a new and better life.

On that day, Peter Lalor surrounded by the diggers, knelt and with his right hand pointed upwards, proclaimed in a loud voice

(Repeat after me) "We swear by the Southern Cross – to stand truly by each other – and fight to defend our rights and liberties". And, at Bakery Hill "AMEN" came loudly from the assembled diggers.

This was the first oath on Australian soil to a flag that was not British that was sworn by men who in large measure owed fealty to Britain.

Whilst the battle was lost by the diggers at the Eureka Stockade a victory was won; as shortly after many of their demands were met. This event undoubtably helped lay the foundations of Australian Democracy which we so cherish today.



Helen Bath - BDIA Vice President:

Thomas Moore was known as the great poet, lyricist, writer and Patriot of Ireland. Among his many famous poems was "The Last Rose of Summer" written in 1805. The poem is very appropriate for Ballarat with its Begonias, roses and even Begonia Roses.

The inspiration for the Thomas Moore statue came from the Irish people of Ballarat, soon after the Robert Burns statue was erected by the Scots. It was sculpted by George Grant in 1889.

'Tis the last rose of summer,

HOTELS IN THE BUNGAREE DISTRICT - An article by Maurice Hanrahan (BDIA Member)



Maurice Hanrahan who is a member of the Bungaree Historical Society has been researching the hotels in the Bungaree District. Details of when each hotel was established, the hotel name and location, Licensees and closure date have been established.

In the first twenty years of settlement 44 hotels had been licenced in the Bungaree District. In addition there were 3 breweries and 1 distillery.

The first hotels were established near the early saw mills and along the first major roads to the goldfields which included Old Melbourne Road and Creswick

Road. As farms were established during the 1860's additional hotels were licenced to service the farming community. Hotels that had been licenced reached a peak of 44 licences issued by 1880.

The Cobb & Co coach commenced running between Melbourne and Ballarat in October 1853 and after reaching Gordon it passed along Old Melbourne Road (South Road) through Millbrook (Moorabool Creek), Dunnstown to Warrenheip. Traffic then branched off and passed through the township of Warrenheip to Eureka Street and on to Main Road, Ballarat. There were 14 hotels along South Road between Millbrook and the Warrenheip Road turnoff. There were an additional 3 hotels in the proximity of the Brewery Tap.

The locations of the hotels included Bungaree 7, Leigh Creek 4, Pootilla 2, Clarks Hill 2, Bullarook 1, Wallace 3, Springbank 3, Musk Creek 1, Claretown 3, Millbrook 4, Dunnstown 6, Warrenheip 8 (excludes Warrenheip township). In addition there were two breweries at Warrenheip and one at Leigh Creek and a Distillery at Dunnstown.

During the 1850's a Justice of the Peace could approve of a Publicans Licence for a Hotel. The first hearing of the Ballarat Licensing Court was in June 1859. The Bungaree Licencing Court was established in 1874.

Maximum number of hotel licences and Hotel Closures.

The 10 year period from mid-1870's to mid 1880's was when most of the 44 hotels were still operating. Several of the very early established hotels were still in business and widespread closures had not commenced. The deep gold mines were at peak production and there was still a demand for timber and wagon transport. The farming population had increased dramatically.

The hotels were the location of most public meetings including the early Bungaree Council meetings, farewells, weddings, card tournaments and other sporting events. The hotels also provided accommodation.

Sporting teams including hurling and football were based at hotels for a hundred years prior to the erection of Recreation Reserves and modern facilities in the mid-21st Century. Often the football ground which was a paddock of a local farm had no facilities and the football team would dress in the hotel and after the game would return to the hotel to shower and change clothes.

The Bungaree Hurling team had the Hurlers Inn at Claretown as their base and after its closure in 1888 they moved to the Ormond (Springbank) hotel for the next 40 years.



Hotel Closures. - article continues...

A large number of hotels closed in the twenty-five year period between 1895 and 1920. There was no single reason for this but a combination of several events which led to the closures. Six of the main reasons for population decline in the district and hotel closures were:

- 1. The Australia wide depression of the mid 1890's.
- 2. A sudden reduction in deep mining activities from 1890 onwards and a corresponding drop in the demand for timber and a reduction in commuting traffic to and from the goldfields.
- 3. Reduction in the fertility of the farm soils combined with the dry seasons and droughts of the 1890's saw a consolidation of some farms. Families who had sold their holdings were leaving the district. The commencement of farm mechanisation resulted in reduced requirements for farm labour and the amalgamation of farms.
- 4. The introduction of the motor car and solid tyre motor truck from around 1915.
- 5. The establishment of the Licence Reduction Board and the development of a fund to compensate the owner and licenced publican when the hotel licence was surrendered. World War 1 created additional pressure on the Licencing Board to reduce Hotel numbers particularly in 1915.
- 6. The Temperance Movement was particularly active throughout most of Victoria.




By 1922 there were no hotels in Clarks Hill, Pootilla, Bolwarrah or Millbrook. Closures continued however at a slower rate. Of the 44 hotels to hold a licence only four remain.

The Bridge Hotel, Bungaree, the Shamrock Hotel, Dunnstown, the Wallace Hotel and the Brewery Tap Hotel at Warrenheip are the only four hotels still in operation from the original forty-eight hotels that have been licenced.

Many of the hotel keepers were Irish and most of their clients were from Ireland or of Irish decent. This is reflected in the names of several district hotels which included the Shamrock hotel and Rock of Cashel at Dunnstown, the Blarney Castle at Warrenheip, the Hurlers Inn at Claretown, the Harp of Erin at Wallace, the Emerald Isle at Bolwarrah and the Ormond hotel at Springbank.

In 1882 the respected politician Mr Dan Brophy MLA who represented Ballarat East electorate which included the Bungaree district, jokingly stated there were only two roads for Catholics-the straight and the crocked one. The straight leads to the public-house, the crocked away from it.
